Statistical Note - FEBRUARY 2021 ECONOMIC IMPACT OF COVID-19 RESTRICTIONS

JobSeeker

During February, the steady downward trend in JobSeeker numbers in the region since peaking in May, continued after a small upward “blip” in December.

The figures indicate that the 10,500 rise in numbers on JobSeeker at the beginning of the Covid restrictions had fallen back by 5,600, ie. by over a half. It means that the numbers on JobSeeker are down to being only 13% (5,000) above those of March 2020.

It can be expected that, as the JobKeeper employment support scheme phases out at end March, numbers on JobSeeker will tend to rise again.

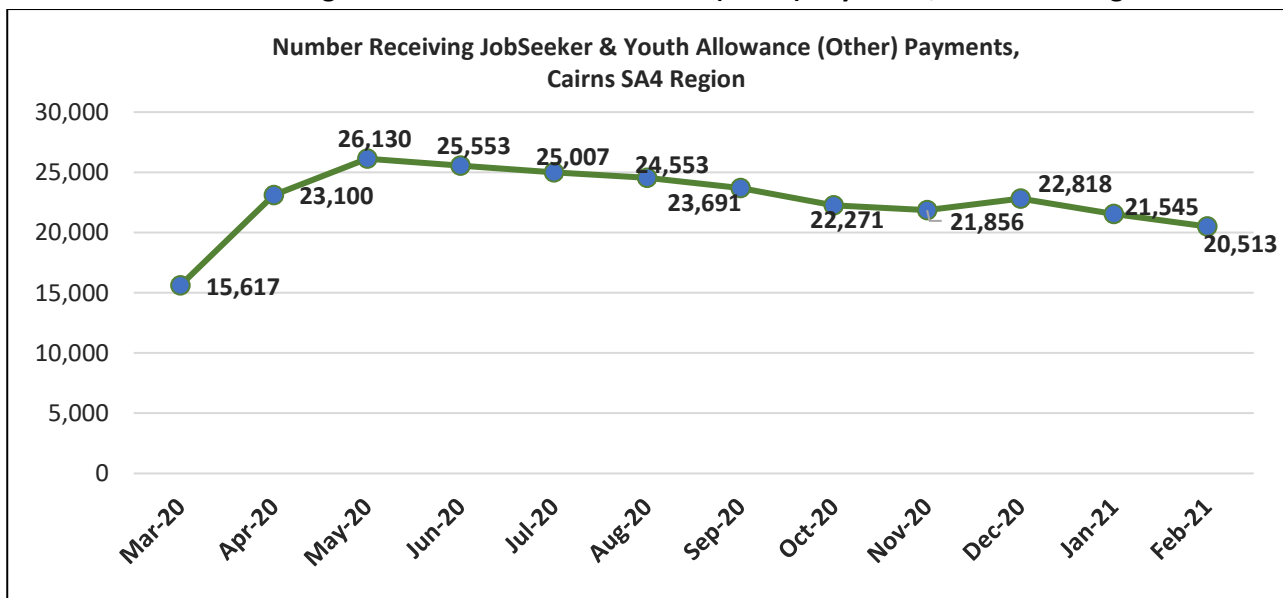

Note: In March 2020, the Department of Social Services changed the definition of JobSeeker from being confined to those on a Newstart Allowance (NSA) with a “Job Search” requirement to include all those on a Newstart Allowance including a substantial number without a “Job Search” requirement, including those directed to training, temporarily sick or injured and undertaking voluntary work.

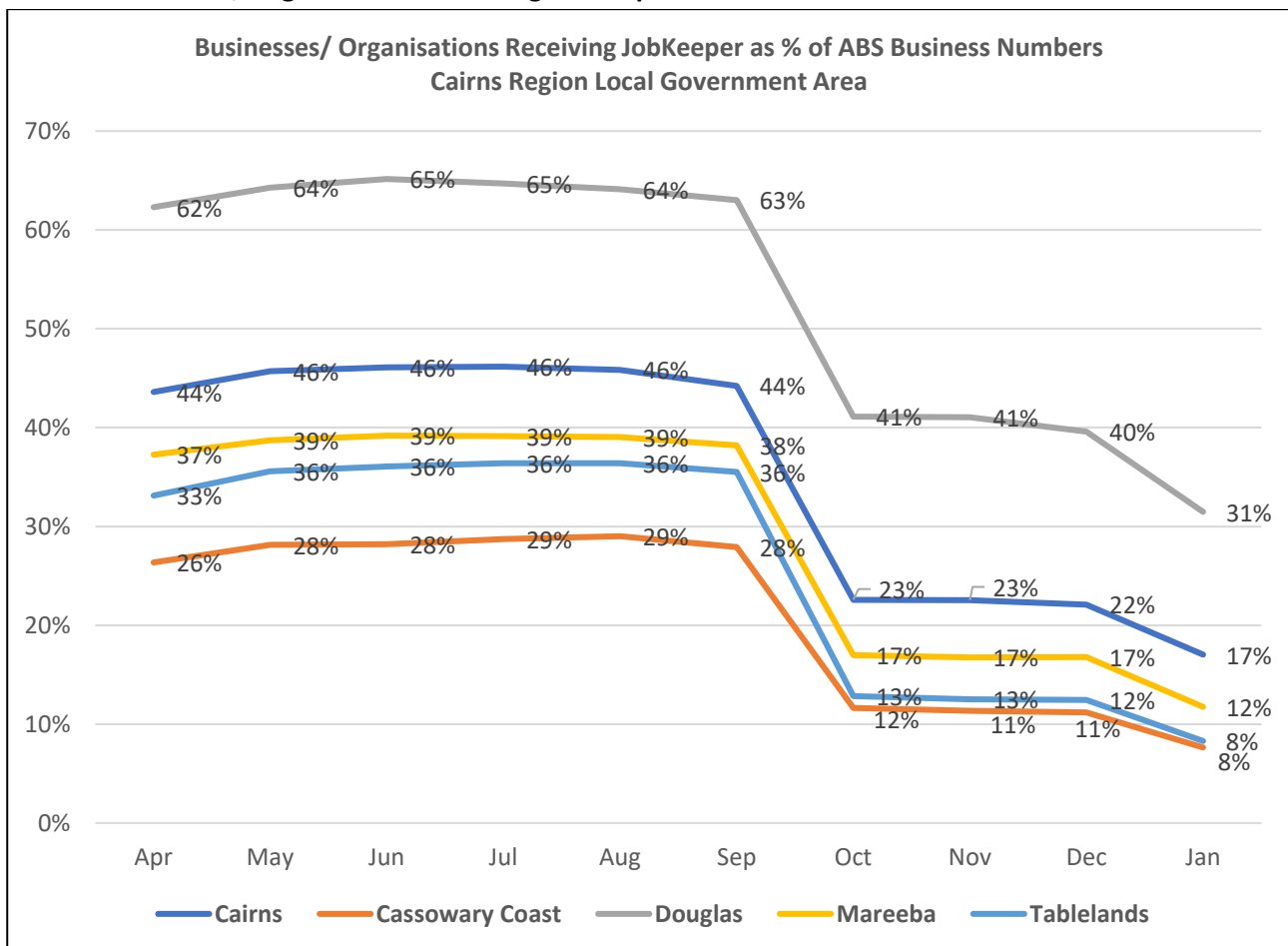
JobKeeper

The following chart shows the number of businesses/ organisations in the region claiming JobKeeper support to maintain employees as a percentage of the number of businesses recorded by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) in the region’s Local Government Areas.

It shows the dramatic fall off in December Quarter as rules tightened compared to the very generous rules in the June and September Quarters. As the economy improved in January, a further reduction in the number of businesses who could qualify for JobKeeper fell by about a quarter. However, when compared with the JobSeeker chart above, it can be seen that transfer of employees to JobSeeker was minimal.

The chart also illustrates the much higher percentage of businesses on JobKeeper assistance in tourism exposed Douglas Shire and Cairns Regional Council area.

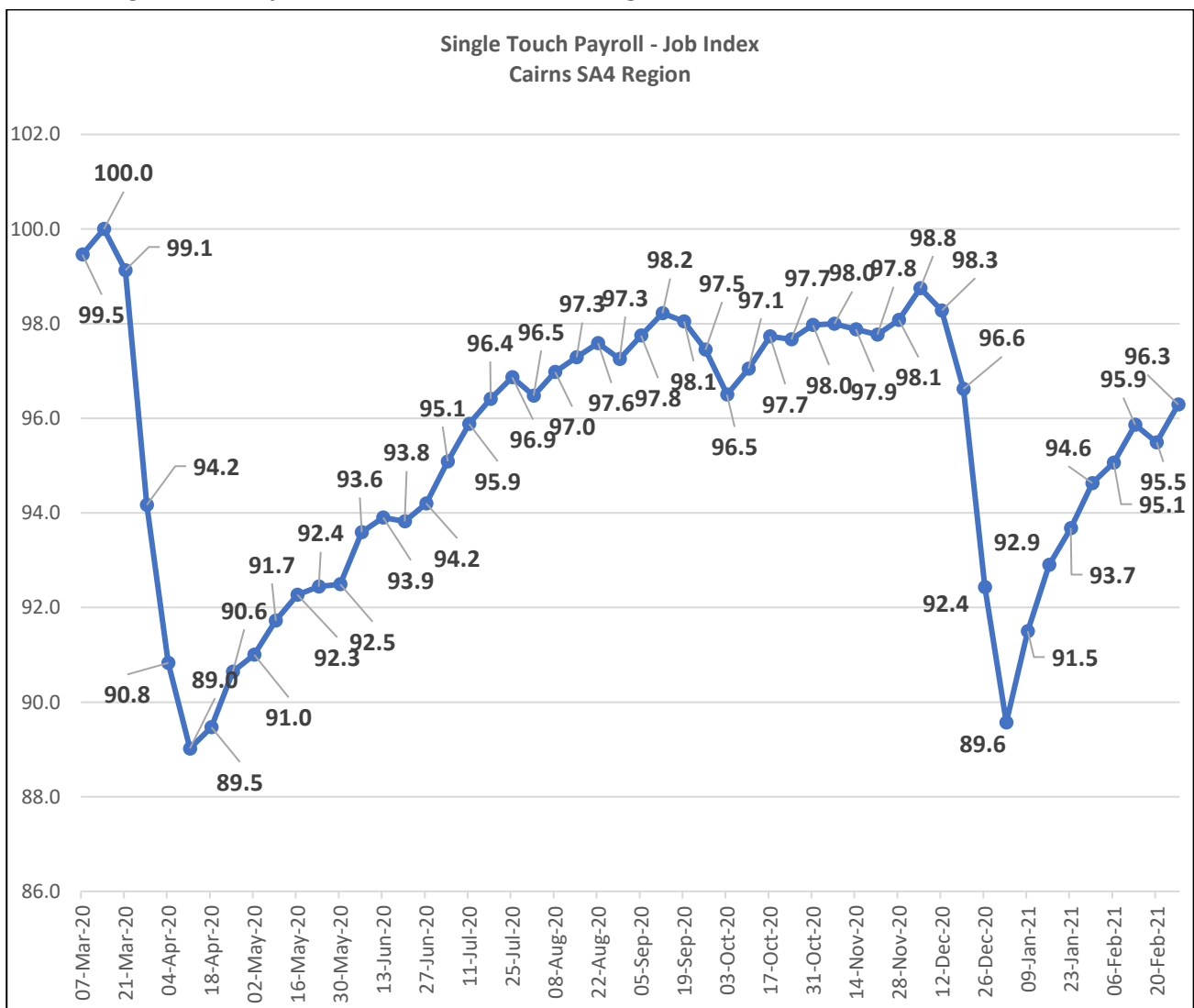
Single Touch Payroll – Jobs Index

A new Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) Index of Jobs recorded through the Single Touch Payroll reporting system to the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) records a sharp fall in the Cairns SA4 region in jobs reported from an Index 100 in week ending 14th March to an Index 89.5 in week ending 11th April (ie. a fall of about 11%).

However, the recovery evident up to September plateaued. Comparison with the foregoing chart on businesses receiving JobKeeper payments helps explain why Payroll Employment Index levels plateaued in the December Quarter.

This is a new series with comparative data from previous years not available. The strong fall over the Xmas period should be ignored at this stage as probably due to offices closing for the Xmas break and not submitting payroll information. Similar patterns are evident in other regions. However, levels reported during January and February rose but not back to pre-Xmas period levels. This would be consistent with the fall off in numbers on JobKeeper and normal seasonal factors.

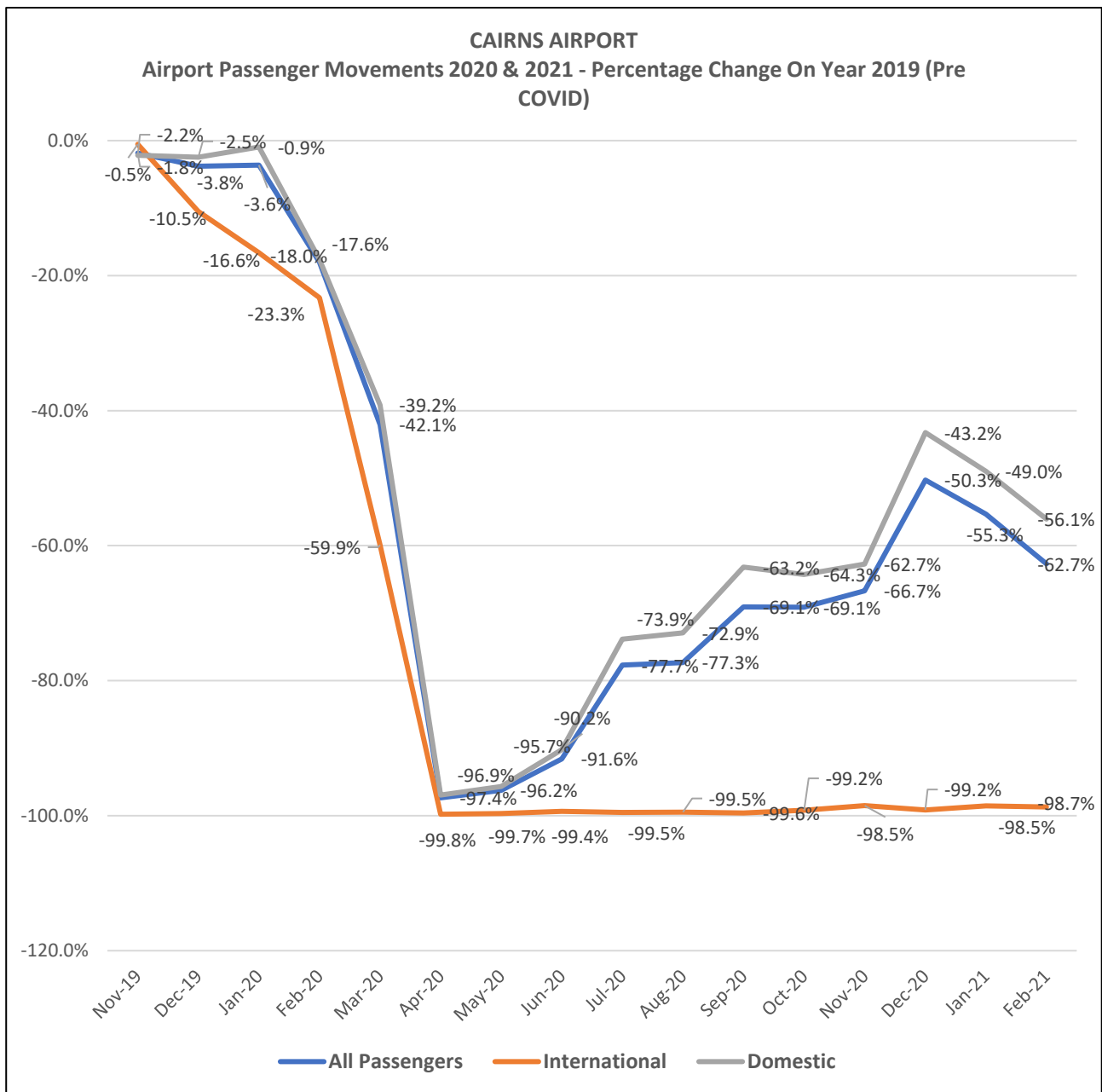
Airport Passengers

The following chart compares passenger movements at Cairns Airport during 2020 and up to February 2021, with the same month pre-COVID in 2019. They indicate the international terminal figures remain flat but that the domestic terminal recovered to being about only 45% down in December.

January and February figures 2021 that are compared with January and February 2019 (ie. pre-COVID), did not see this recovery sustained. The figures indicate that overall numbers are still down about 50%.

However, information from Cairns Airport indicates that capacity on the main routes to Cairns from Brisbane, Sydney and Melbourne is expected to increase in April
